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undoubtedly the most influential black intellectual of the twentieth century and one of america s finest historians w e b dubois knew that the liberation of the african american people required liberal education and not vocational training he saw education as a process of teaching certain timeless values moderation an avoidance of luxury a concern for courtesy a capacity to endure a nurturing love for beauty at the same time dubois saw education as fundamentally subversive this was as much a function of the well established role of education from plato forward as the realities of the social order under which he lived he insistently calls for great energy and initiative for african americans controlling their own lives and for continued experimentation and innovation while keeping education s fundamentally radical nature in view though containing speeches written nearly one hundred years ago and on a subject that has seen more stormy debate and demagoguery than almost any other in recent history the education of black people approaches education with a timelessness and timeliness at once rooted in classical thought that reflects a remarkably fresh and contemporary relevance

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in true to the language game keith gilyard one of the major african american figures to emerge in language and cultural studies makes his most seminal work available in one volume this collection of new and previously published essays contains gilyard s most relevant scholarly contributions to deliberations about linguistic diversity cultural identity critical literacy writing instruction literary texts and popular culture the volume also features contemporary treatises on such timely topics as students right to

their own language code switching pedagogy and political discourse surrounding the rise of barack obama gilyard weaves together serious analysis theoretical work policy discussions and personal reflections on the interplay of language literacy and social justice to make true to the language game essential reading for students and scholars in rhetorical studies composition studies applied linguistics and education

this book is an exploration of the material conditions of the production of african literature drawing on the archives of heinemann s african writers series it highlights the procedures relationships demands ideologies and counterpressures engendered by the publication of three major authors chinua achebe wole soyinka and ngugi wa thiongo as a study of the history and techniques of african literary texts this book advances a theory of reciprocity of effects what it terms auto heteronomy to describe the dynamic of formalist activism by which texts anticipate and shape the forces of literary production in advance it serves as a departure from the death of the author thesis by reconsidering the role of the author in african literature and culture industry as well as the influence of african publics on writers aesthetic choices and on the overall processes of production this work is a major contribution to african literary history literary criticism and book history

rereading the historical record indicates that it is no longer so easy to argue that history is simply prior to its forms since the mid 1990s a new wave of research has formed around wider debates in the humanities and social sciences such as decentering the subject new analytics of power reconsideration of one dimensional time and three dimensional space attention to beyond archival sources alterity otherness the invisible and more in addition broader and contradictory impulses around the question of the nation transnational post national proto national and neo national movements have unearthed a new series of problematics and focused scholarly attention on traveling discourses national imaginaries and less formal processes of socialization bonding

and subjectification new curriculum history challenges prior occlusions in the field building upon and departing from previous waves of scholarship extending the focus beyond the insularity of public schooling the traditional framework of the self contained nation state and the psychology of the schooled individual drawing on global studies historical sociology postcolonial studies critical race theory visual culture theory disability studies psychoanalytics cambridge school structuralisms poststructuralisms and infra and transnational approaches the volume holds together not despite but because of differences and incommensurabilities in rereading historical records
